This small booklet is a summary of what we have heard and some initial thoughts on what this may mean for your town.


ABOUT THE RCA

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

We'd like to hear what is missing and whether this sounds like your town.


WHO ARE WE?





A place that thrives as a market town for everyone around.


Better housing, more leisure and sport. Bringing together the old and the new. Returning things to nature.



What drives you nuts about where you live?

The congestion. The daft one way system. The clutter in the streets (railings, ghastly bins, street "furniture", badly planted trees etc). Traffic and parking; lack of more upmarket shops and restaurants; county lines drugs and homelessness beginning to affect the town; Traffic congestion. Lack of consultation about local issues and complete disregard of any feedback given. Traffic, litter, graffiti, blocked storm water drains, woefully poor pavements. Only the noise of the A1. If the road surface could be improved, or electric vehicles will be quieter, it would be perfect here. The threat of development. Lack of communication, pitiful sense of community. Issues with parking on the estate, poor quality of roads and dangerous speeding on roads into Town. Not enough places for the elderly to live. Not everyone has their own transport the town centre needs more shops that sell goods that Biggleswade used to have. Like gas and electric cookers clothing for the elderly knickers/coats/..not food outlets and estate agents. Litter. The continuing building on agricultural land and unsustainable development. Lack of cycle facilities eg cycle path on London Road from Eagle Farm Road to Dunton Corner. Although the A1 is convenient as a major route, access to it can be difficult at times. Traffic. Lack of public transport to local towns. Too many new houses and not enough infrastructure.




Any barriers?



East to west connection takes an eternity, busy, congestion, illegible route. Town centre on the far west of the town.

Integration across communities, new folks moving into King's Reach need to be part of Biggleswade, not Biggleswade New Town. Unwelcoming to newcomers.

We need more leadership locally and nationally, we need more creativity, common sense and care. We need to coordinate our efforts, build capacity and finance. We need to get rid of gridlock and keep development sane. We need new homes to be better quality or not built at all and to get rid of traffic, we need our bus system to work! And if that isn't enough <u>let's reimagine night school</u>, teach everyone new languages, pottery and art!



2. ABOUT OUR COMMUNITY

SPECIAL PUBLIC PLACES



- → We <u>love the market square</u>, with its fresh produce and farmer's days, a special place where events take place, the carnival parade, where the Christmas lights come to light up our town.
- → We enjoy village life, a quiet pace of life. Living close to the shops and the leisure centre. Some of our family lives nearby, with friendly people and minimal crime, and schools nearby, Biggleswade Town is a pleasant place, life is all around us.
- → We <u>enjoy</u> singing in the Choral Society at Trinity

 Methodist Church, <u>we like to socialise at the Camera Club</u>

 at the Weatherley Centre. We like it when everything's in walking distance.
- The public space that surrounds Biggleswade is special indeed, with walks and fishing on the River Ivel, and cycles to Beeston Green. Our public space extends far beyond our boundaries across the Common to the RSPB Lodge. The Green Wheel is a special place where we run, we cycle and walk.

Tell us about a public place in your town that needs improving

- The town centre is in need of more upmarket shops and restaurants, things for young people to do, that sell the goods we used to have like gas and electric cookers, clothing for the elderly, knickers, coats, we don't just want food outlets and estate agents! We want a vibrant town centre without clutter in the streets, railings, traffic, litter. We want to spend time in the town centre to shop, have a relaxed meal, without worrying our two-hours of free parking is up!
- → We're concerned about empty premises in the town

 centre, and we fear that the new health and social care hub

 will be placed on the very corner of the town. We fear for

 losing valuable services in our centre, where older people

 can easily reach.
- → We need space for bike racks in the station now people are riding their bikes more! The station must be accessible to everyone. For those of us who are less able, with buggies or luggage what weighs a tonne.
- → We <u>need more events in our community hubs</u>, with hubs that encourage integration of old and new Biggleswade and celebrate our diversity.

Tell us anything else that you think is important to know about your town and its people

- We have <u>civic pride in our historic market town</u>, there is not a hectic pace of life here, people care for others and the area. But we <u>need some injection of new ideas and inspiration!</u>
- Our demographic is shifting and our population is growing. We now have a Biggleswade Indian Society and substantial numbers of Eastern Europeans. The aspirations of people living in Biggleswade are shifting, especially with more younger residents. We need more things to do for young people like a youth club, shops and entertainment.
- → We <u>need more sport and leisure facilities</u> as our population grows, and we fear for the pressure the new development will have on our existing services and infrastructure.
- → Some of us feel that <u>Biggleswade is not always</u>

 <u>welcoming</u> to those of us moving from Stevenage, Welwyn,

 Hatfield or London. We need more understanding of the

 changes which must take place to accommodate and support

 the very diverse new residents coming here.
- → Local people need to give their views, engage with regularity, as changes and new services develop.

3. GETTING AROUND TOWN

VALUE OF TRANSPORT



EVERYDAY JOURNEYS THAT MAKE US SMILE



The Green Wheel makes us smile! We walk there, run there cycle there, and beyond - to local villages we visit, the RSPB to the north, and Beeston Green too. It is quiet and cared for, lovely and open.

→ We walk to the River Ivel to watch people fish, filled with a sense of the history of our lovely old town. We walk through footpaths and alleyways to the historic church of St Andrew, through country roads and open fields, to Jordan's Mill and see that enormous sky - what a pleasant area we live in.

Turning into our road, toward our home makes us smile, seeing regular services visiting the estate makes us smile. The milkman, an ice cream van, the postman, a cbc minibus dropping off neighbours child.

Tell us about a journey or everyday experience that needs improving

- → Getting from East to West is unpleasant, busy, an illegible route, some might even call it a nightmare.
- The buses are irregular and unreliable, but driving along the High St can take an eternity! With cars speeding, noise and potholes, with poor surface defects, and cars parked both sides. Watch out for the dangerous corners, and watch out for the parking along Lawrence Rd its an accident waiting to happen!
- And what of reaching our surrounding nature, <u>cannot Dan</u>

 <u>Albone's car park be free for our Town</u>, to walk down the common or to sit near the river?
- → <u>We need some affordable parking in the centre</u>. But there's so much traffic and congestion! Especially at the start and end of the school day. But the roads aren't good

for walking, unpleasant and busy with narrow pavements on a camber in Back st, and unlit pavements with harsh shadows on London rd at night. Some roads are unsafe for people, cyclists, and cars alike.

- → To cross the train track there are but four points to do it. Three need replacing, two are one-way and the other holds a narrow pavement and an unstable surface.
- Perhaps we need roundabouts along the A1, though joining that road in the morning's not fun. But the worst is when the A1 road is diverted, right through the centre of town!

BELIEFS ABOUT OUR FUTURE

LOCKDOWN OPTIMISM



- During Lockdown we found ourselves in nature! We took to walking and cycling more, spending time in the countryside, growing to value our green spaces, like the Green Wheel and Biggleswade Common.
 - → Lockdown made Biggleswade more pleasant. People were friendlier which reminds us of what we liked when we first came to Biggleswade.
 - → Our community came together to help each other, residents, neighbours showing care and concern for others. With food banks, and volunteering, support for the vulnerable, the Good Neighbour Scheme and the Baptist Church!
 - → It was a **reality check** to how people currently live their lives.

LOCKDOWN CONCERNS


- → We're worried about the collapsing economy leading to job losses, people turning to drugs and violence as a result of losing their livelihoods. We worry for the education of our town's children. And what of future jobs for our young people? Can they really learn from those more experienced through remote-working?
- How will the estate of the economy affect our spaces of culture, our small businesses? Will our thriving market and town centre survive?
- → Illness worries us and lack of local healthcare too, especially if we're in the vulnerable category. We worry for those in isolation, we're worried about loneliness. It is concerning for the elderly, who struggle to stand in queues for the chemist, who rely on the now-closed local shops as a life-line.
- → We fear because of the poor national leadership in this uncertain time, how long might it take before we can get back to normality? We need to work against selfishness and negativity. We must keep volunteering, we must engage with decision-makers. We cannot work in our silos!

OUR IDEAL FUTURE TOWN

- We want a 20-minute community that is easy to navigate.

 A curated jumble of amenities, library, art gallery,
 restaurants, cafes and shops. We want fun, laughter and
 love, support and integration and places that are local,
 so we don't have to drive.
- We want to be able to get around town by bus or park if we need to drive, and facilities so that no-one is disabled by things outside. We want amenities and services that are not driven by profit and a happy and harmonious place that's free from crime.
- → We want a town centre that is larger and less cluttered.


 A place for people not for cars. We want a place for drivers to park so they can walk instead of drive and space for bikes and e-scooters too. We want our schools and centres to be vibrant and inclusive, not to close on the weekends and be separate from the town. We want plays, concerts and music, more dance and activities, more sport and entertainment all round.
- → We need more attractive housing, interesting shops and restaurants, less mindless vandalism too. We need better





walking and cycling paths and no more new housing, a community that's bustling and friendly too.



- → We need our market square to grow and to be filled with events and activities and if there is new housing then let's have a community cinema as well. The future needs to include more sports, leisure and places for the young and the elderly to get around and have a pee! We need to come together as a town and imagine a better economy for everyone, not just a selected few. We need to be ready to change but keep what is good about the past. We need to be optimistic and ambitious because communities are created together! We need to break down silos - because everything is connected in the end. We need to take notice of what we do each say. We need to become a transition town! We need neighbourhood centres as well as town centres and our planners should care as much about our open space as they do about housing and development. We need to imagine the future and be prepared to debate through our differences.


